The winds of change continue to gust through Elk Horn. Our gift shop renovations are finally complete, and we're excited to see how the opening of this year's travel season starts for us. The kitchen merchandise area is finally complete, as is the aebleskiver pan display. Our Christmas wall is redone with new and exciting lines we have picked up in the last month, and the facelifts to our candle area and Vi-



king corners are also complete. To add to all of this, our new Welcome Center hub has been running smoothly and we're able to showcase everything going on with ease.

To highlight a few of these changes, we're particularly excited about the new aebleskiver display. We sell 5 different pans including 3 cast iron pans, an electric pan, and a cast aluminum pan. Our visitors always have lots of questions about the differences and recommendations, and so now each pan has a small sign highlighting unique features as well as care instructions. Meanwhile, the new shelving we've acquired from IKEA gives the area a nice, modern look while keeping all of the food items more organized and easier to find.

We're also ready to introduce our new line of artificial flowers from Gry & Sif, a Danish design company. We have tulips and anemones in various colors and other accent pieces to compliment any arrangement. To compliment these, we've also added a new line of vases, made in 3 sizes using 3D printing and recycled materials.

Finally, we are delighted to share that the Danish Lakrids are back in the shop again after not having them for a few years. Chocolate-licorice candies in a variety of classic flavors are on the shelves now and we have the true licorice candies arriving soon in sweet, red, and salmiak.

Looking ahead, we will soon have two new t-shirt designs featuring our main Danish Windmill – Elk Horn, Iowa design in both solid red and cardinal (the color of our crewneck and hoodies). We will pick up a long sleeve version of the solid red shirt next Fall. We hope to have the new tshirts in the shop sometime next week and we expect them to go quickly.

And on March 21st we will join the Danish Villages in celebrating another Throwback Thor's Day featuring a Danish meal at Norse Horse tavern as well as aebleskiver at the bakery. The windmill will be open late as usual along with other businesses in town. This is a great opportunity to get a delicious Danish meal and see all the changes we've made.

Finally, we want to remind everyone of our fundraiser for the daycare coming up in April. Every Sunday will feature a food option in town and we will be donating all tour revenue (donations and admissions) to the local daycare, Kids in the Village. The first session will be on Sunday, April 7th and the Kringle Man will be open from 10am – 2pm serving aebleskiver and medisterpølse.

The last article talked about how global warming is increasing the strength of weather events. Scientists are discussing that the facts are pointing to the need for a category six hurricane ranking. The current rankings have been in use since before the effects of global warming have become evident.

If you look at the scale you will notice that it is based on wind speed increases to move to the next category.

Cat 1. 74 MPH to 95 MPH

Cat 2. 96 MPH to 110 MPH

Cat 3. 111 MPH to 129 MPH

Cat 4. 130 MPH to 156 MPHww

Cat 5. 157 MPH or higher.


Or higher is the problem. All other categories have an upper limit. There have been seven storms in the last decade where the wind speed was much higher than 157 MPH which would have triggered an increase in category if there had been a higher category. Since the categories are designed to allow citizens and governments to properly prepare for these events this could pose a severe problem. A structure designed to protect against a Cat 5 storm may not protect against what should have been a Cat 6 storm.

I am sure that there are folks that are thinking that we don't get hurricanes here, so why should we care? Every time there is a major storm causing major damage it does affect us. It causes the cost of building materials to rise because of the increased demand created by the storm damage. It could result in higher taxes due to the amount of government aid flowing to the devastated area. Insurance companies exist by spreading the cost of their insurance claims across a wide pool of the insured policy owners. Many times, it can even cause local shortages of qualified craftsmen as contractors working in the damaged area seek to find additional help.

Another facet that most do not consider is how many people are displaced from the devastated area. This can cause a rise in rental rates as the displaced people seek temporary housing. It can cause a shortage of employment opportunities as these folks fill local jobs. An influx of school age children can put a strain on our local schools as the displaced children need to continue their education. And they could strain our mental health resources as they try to cope with what they have lost.

We must realize that global warming is causing problems for everyone on this planet. Some of them directly, and like hurricanes some indirectly.





Scratches From The Rusty Quill By Wava Petersen

Does anyone remember when Monday was the designated day for washing clothes? Or washing clothes on a washboard? I happened onto a guide for washday by an unknown author detailing the procedure back in the early years of the 20th century. It is written in the spelling and vernacular of that era.

- 1. Build fire in backyard to heet kettel of rain water.
- 2. Set tubs so smoke won't blow in eyes if wind is pert.
- 3. Shave one hole cake lie soap in bilin water.
- 4. Sort things, make 3 piles, 1 pile white, 1 pile colord, 1 pile work britches and rags.
- 5. Stir flour in cold water to smoot, then thin down with bilin water to make starch.
- 6. Rub durty spots on worshbord, scrub hard, then bile whites. Take out of bilin water with broomstick handel, rench and starch. Don't bile uthers, just rench and starch.
- 7. Spread tee towls on grass. Hang colords and overalls on closeline and rags on fence.
- 8. Pore rench water on flower bed.
- 9. Scrub porch with hot soapy water.
- 10. Turn tubs upside down
- 11. Go put on fresh dress. Smoot hare with comb, pore a cup of coffee. Sit and rest a spell and count blessings.

Even with several exceptions, that pretty well describes wash day when I was small. All water had to be carried from the well at the bottom of the hill, heated in the kitchen on the cookstove. The washing process also took place in the kitchen on a washboard that had a corrugated metal surface. My mother provided the woman-power as she scrubbed the dirty clothes back and forth on that primitive appliance. The wet clothes were hung on the clothesline, a smooth, heavy wire, supported by two sturdy tree trunks. Then, on her hands and knees, Mother used the grimy water to scrub the wide, splintery boards of the kitchen floor. If any water was left in the pail, she used that to clean the short sidewalk that led to a waterless well. It had dried up in the arid years of the depression. There was no fence and nary a blade of grass to be found in the yard. We didn't have home-made lye soap; Mother's old standby was P & G laundry soap, slivered with a sharp knife and melted in the hot wash water. (My mother would have been appalled at the lack of proper spelling in that washday guide! Pronunciation, however, was a different story. We didn't wash our hands, dishes or clothes back then; we "worshed" them. Either way, they somehow got clean.) I don't remember my mother ever making starch with flour. Her laundry starch came in a box from the grocery store. Mixed with hot water, and a tiny, oblong bar containing bluing, it had a scent that made the clothes smell really good. Degree of stiffness was determined by the amount of water in the starch.

Electricity came to our farm in 1939. Like a magic wand, it changed our way of life. The first major purchase was a brand-new Maytag washing machine. A far cry from the automated appliances of the 21st century it was nevertheless like a gift from the gods for my hardworking mother. An electric iron also lightened her laundry burdens.

My first washing machine arrived soon after our marriage. It was an old model electric machine, belonging to my grandmother, but no longer in use.



Soon-after came a new Maytag washer. Shortly before we moved to the farm an electric dryer blessed my life. Then came the move to the farm. Being a farmer's wife as well as full time employment off the farm left little free time and an automatic washer became a necessity, not a luxury. Our water was supplied via wind-power. Water was pumped to a cistern on the hillside above the farmyard. From that vantage point gravity provided the water pressure.

On windy days the mill turned rapidly; pressure was high. On windless days, not so much. And the major problem with that washer was that it filled by a timer, not by weight or water level. There were many trips made to the basement to reset that timer during the years we had that washer.

The first time I heard the ringing bell announcing the washing was finished, I rushed down the steps and opened the lid. All I could see was the bottom of the tub shining up at me in all its pristine glory. That machine had swallowed my clothes, hook, line and sinker, but how? A sock, maybe. Or a washcloth. But devour a whole load of laundry! Only on closer inspection did I discover the entire load packed firmly on the walls of the tub by the centrifugal force of the spin cycle.

There is a lot to be said about the good old days, but when it comes to methods of washing clothes, the only good thing to be said about the good old days is that the good old days are over. I would certainly not enjoy having to part with my automatic washer and dryer and return to the back-breaking task of scrub-

bing clothes on a worshbord.

MERLYN KNUDSEN

What is it like to be an Iowa farm boy, the son of an immigrant Danish mother (and immigrant Danish grandparents on his father's side)? What is it like to live during a period of American history when fathers, uncles, and older brothers shared (or sometimes didn't share) many stories about being soldiers during WWII? What is it like to learn that a new road called the interstate would be built from coast to coast? What is it like to hear people talk about a "Cold War" or to hear people discussing "Civil Rights." On the fun side, what is it like to have that newfangled

entertainment called TV to watch in the evening after chores have been finished? Ask Merlyn—those were the years when he was growing up and entering manhood.

In 1952 during his senior year, Merlyn made the decision to enlist in the Navy Reserves. He and three other boys from Harlan High School went to Fort Omaha for enlistment. The Navy Reserves used a slightly different training timetable for students who were still in high school. Instead of the usual eight weeks of boot camp, the Reservists did two weeks and then divided the remainder of training over several periods of time. This allowed the students to do both military training and continue in high school at the same time. By the time Merlyn finished high school, he had completed one year of his eight-year enlistment. His Navy aptitude tests pointed him in the direction of being a good fit for either submarine duty or yeoman duty. As you can imagine, his family was happy when he was assigned yeoman duty. The fact that he had done well in his typing class in high school and his ability to perform administrative functions served him well.

Unlike other branches of the military where boot camp is conducted on many bases, the Navy sends all sailors to Great Lakes Naval Station for training. The huge base (over 1,600 acres) functions like a small city with its own fire department, police, and public works department. It's location near Chicago offered Merlyn an opportunity to explore some of the more interesting sights of the city. Of particular interest to him was riding Chicago's elevated railway called the L. Although he didn't begin to cover all of the 225 miles the L covers, he was fascinated by the elevated railway. It certainly gave him a different perspective of the city as the train whizzed along and he could look into the second story windows of businesses.

For a good share of Merlyn's time, he lived in Lincoln, Nebraska in military housing. During this time, he married and began a family. Although the majority of his time was spent on dry land, he did get sent out to sea on three cruises.

Each of these cruises was on a different type of Navy ship. One was an Amphibious Cargo Ship which is designed to carry troops, heavy equipment and supplies in support of amphibious assaults. The second cruise he was on a dock landing ship, an amphibious warfare ship used to launch landing craft and amphibious vehicles. The third cruise he was on a destroyer. He mentioned being in the harbor of Cuba. Batista was still in power, but Castro was preparing for takeover. Merlyn chose to stay on board the ship. Merlyn remembers a scary incident that happened as he was leaving work.

An Air Force plane came in and couldn't get it's wheels down to land. (The Navy and Air Force shared the same landing strip.) It made an emergency landing with all the emergency precautions. Seven men jumped off the plane to safety. Needless to say, there was plenty of excitement and much relief when everyone was declared safe.



At the completion of his eight years of service, Merlyn returned to the Kimballton area and continued farming. In 1976 tragedy struck his family when he lost his wife to cancer. Unexpectedly, at a silver wedding anniversary dance in Kimballton, he "re-met" a friend from childhood school days. She, too, had experienced tragedy when her husband was killed in a plane crash (also in 1976). The rest is sweet history—a new blended family was formed with Merlyn's four children and Jeanette's two children.

Merlyn is a lifetime member of the AMVETS. At the time he was discharged he was not eligible for the American Legion. During his younger years, he was, however, actively involved in helping with Memorial Day services at Bethlehem, Bethany, and Immanuel Lutheran churches.

Merlyn didn't "fess" up to this, but it certainly appears that one of his Navy cruises took him to the "Fountain of Youth." For a man who will very soon turn 90, it appears evident he definitely visited that famous fountain!

Burn Baby Burn Disco Inferno

The museum has a contract with the local volunteer fire department to burn the prairie when needed. On Tuesday evening, the fire department burned the front Berms. This upcoming Sunday, they will return to burn the prairie.

Why do we burn the prairie? Controlled burns help maintain the prairie's health and functionality. A prairie burn in spring removes old vegetation and allows the sun to reach the dirt, warming it and causing more microbial activity. Thus, nutrients are readily available for the emerging prairie plants, triggering seed germination in some species. The roots of the native prairie plants can run 8-10 feet and can withstand topside fires. These burns also assist us in removing invasive species.










Dr. McCance to Present on Colorectal Cancer Screening at Next Healthy U

SPARK! at the Museum of Danish America Cultural Programming for Lifelong Learning


