

GOOD NEWS!

YES, THERE IS GOOD NEWS!

What is a sharp knife worth to you? You've ordered a steak at your favorite restaurant, after a few minutes the waiter sets before you

ITS ONLY SCIENCE

We talked about the Quality System of Management in the last article. What would happen if we used it to look at a long-time suggested improvement for the Village. Namely, a recreational trail between Kimballton and the "Grove". The first step would be to determine if we have a feasible route. And are the adjacent landowners in favor of its location?

Can the route be made ADA compliant? This is a crucial step account all of the larger grant funders would require this. Projects like this have a large price tag so those big grant dollars are necessary. One factor that must be considered is the ADA requirement that any grades must be 5% or less to comply. And consideration for the safe use of other powered mobility devices should be a factor in the design. These would include wheelchairs, power chairs, etc. The trail might be required to zig zag across the face of the hillside which would require more right-of-way and additional paving.


One thing that has previously been discussed is to have the trail between Elk Horn and the grove be a "natural" surface trail. But ADA requirements preclude this and require a solid surface trail. When the route crosses a roadway ditch or waterway how will this be done? In a road ditch a culvert could be used, or a short free-span bridge could be constructed. A culvert would be cheaper but could requires more frequent attention than a bridge. One must consider the different maintenance requirements between those choices as the grants for the trail will require it to be maintained for no less than 20 years. It must be determined who will do this maintenance. They normally like to see a governmental agency attest that they will do the maintenance. This normally would be parks or conservation boards.

Does the project have broad local support. Are there local people or businesses that will contribute funding for the required grant funds match. Some granters will allow "in kind" donations of material, equipment and labor while others will not.

When dealing with a large-scale project it is often beneficial to break it into logical phases. This can allow flexibility in seeking funding and may actually improve the results of your grant applications.

This is not all the thoughtful attention that would need to be taken but are just examples. By using the Quality System one can develop a better plan for the project. And the better thought out the plan will determine how favorably a grantor will view your application.

When old farts go on a ride



The Season of Hunger By Juanita Erickson

During the months of June, July and August of this year, the food pantries located at the Exira Christian Church and the Elk Horn Lutheran Church will be working to help reduce summer hunger affecting school age children in the Exira-Elk Horn-Kimballton school district.

Thinking of summertime brings to mind thoughts of kids playing outside, vacations, family time at the local swimming pool, picnics and fun. For many families it's also a time of increased worry and hunger.

Throughout the school year lower income families can count on their school age children being able to eat up to 10 meals a week at school. Summer changes all of

that. If they are old enough to stay at home when their parents work or if they have a stay at home parent there is suddenly an increase of 40 meals per child every month that must be provided. That's almost doubling the number of meals these kids eat at home. In these families money is always limited. All too often the grocery list can be what takes the hit.

Research shows that food insecurity can have numerous negative effects on children. Both their physical and mental health can suffer and if it occurs when school is not in session then the "summer slide" can be worsened and kids can lose even more academic ground than their classmates do over the same period.

In families that are dealing with food insecurity meals might be missed. Oftentimes a parent might skip meals so that their children can eat although there are definitely cases where the children miss meals as well. The food will probably not be as nutritious as the children need. Fresh food is especially expensive and families may very well resort to high carbohydrate fillers to get food in everyone's stomach. Even if the parents do manage to stretch the food by whatever means they can, the worry still exists. Kids are smart and they observe. They see their parents skipping meals, and the stress of trying to juggle bills and buying food can't be hidden from them. The children see these things and worry themselves. This can have a profound effect on their health as well.

Thanks largely to a donation from Apex Energy, our local food pantries will be providing additional food for eligible students in the Exira-EHK district during the upcoming summer months. To qualify, students must reside in the school district, be entering grades K-12 in the fall of 2024, and the family must be within certain income guidelines. Those students who receive free or reduced priced meals at school automatically meet the income test.

An emphasis will be placed on providing as many healthy options as possible while keeping the preparation of the food simple so that older kids can prepare the meals themselves. The beet canning process began with pulling the entire plants, scrubbing each one thoroughly and cutting off the greens about an inch or two from the beautiful magenta root; then boiling, cooling and slipping the skins, being sure to save the juice to add color to the finished product. The beet-roots were sliced or cut into chunks, the syrup was added and they were brought back to a boil before being packed in sterilized jars. Oh, how pretty they looked as they took their place with the many other home-canned products lining the fruit-room shelves. And how good they tasted. I often canned a dozen or two quarts every summer.

Time passed, the girls were in school and a job opening came up that I couldn't resist. The vegetable producing plot became the shrunken garden. A year or so later we moved to the farm. Farming took precedence over gardening and eventually the garden disappeared entirely. But we did miss those home-canned beets. Once in a blue moon I come up with what I consider a really good idea. Why not cut my tried-and-true recipe down to minimum proportions? It actually worked. This original beet pickle recipe came from Frank Field many years ago on his 7:15 a.m. weather and down-on-the-farm radio report as he kept his listeners informed of his gardening and canning prowess. My mother passed the recipe on to me.

The secret to success: Forget about the growing, harvesting, cleaning, cooking and slicing processes. Begin with a trip to the grocery store where you will purchase two 15 oz. cans of sliced beets. Drain, reserving some of the juice. Make a syrup of one-half cup vinegar, one-half cup beet juice, one-half cup sugar, one third teaspoon cinnamon. Heat to boiling. Add beets and bring all back to boiling. Pack in sterilized jars. Makes approx. 2 pints. Cool and store in the refrigerator. These make a colorful addition to a relish tray and keep well for several weeks. Though the beets may not be fresh from the garden, you can enjoy "freshly canned" beet pickles in April or any other month of the year.

So, you don't like beets? That's OK. I do, and beets in any form most certainly beat brussels sprouts and a host of other foods by a long-shot. We grew a lot of tomatoes in our Jacksonville years. One variety was called a Beefsteak tomato, huge, meaty and delicious. Lyle's family ate their fresh tomatoes with a generous shake of salt; my family ate fresh tomatoes with a generous spoonful of sugar. It was early in September, the garden was still flourishing and our first baby was on the way. And I was finding out what morning sickness was all about. One morning I was just too nauseated to get my head off the pillow. Lyle had to get his own breakfast and pack his own lunch before leaving for work. Thoughtful husband that he was, he took time before leaving to bring me a rather unorthodox breakfast in bed, a piece of toast topped with a huge slice of tomato. It was beautiful and eventually I felt good enough to take a bite. What a shock to my taste buds! I'm sure that tomato had enough salt on it to float a dozen eggs. There was nothing to do but drag myself out of bed and get rid of it, though it was many,

many years later that I confessed to him. It was so sweet of him to do that but it certainly would have been a lot sweeter with a teaspoonful of sugar.

This will notify all phones that are set up within the system. The Contractor is working on fixing the communication between the tower and 3 wells. Contractors are also fixing the permanganate leak, progress is made. Contractors are doing everything that needs to be done to correct this. \$25,572.38 retainage is being held back due to items that need to be fixed and/or finalized. 2yr warranty starts when project is complete. 3' of floor needs epoxied and will be fixed at water plant. Petersen discussed the concern that the Electrical Contractor still has items that need cleaned and picked up. This will also be handled by the Contractor. What's that delicious smell? Three guesses and the last two don't count. You guessed correctly—it's a pie baking in the oven. But we're getting ahead of the story.

IN HONO

Frank Olsen grew up in Carroll, Iowa . As a young teenager he had many questions about life and what he wanted to do with his future. He dropped out of school and worked several jobs. In 1965 when he turned eighteen, he volunteered for a five-year stint in the Army. He said goodbye to Iowa's cornfields and headed to Fort Bliss, Texas.

Frank remembers his drill sergeant as being a huge man, with a voice that matched his body. He was everything a person thinks of about a drill sergeant. One day during basic training he called (or rather yelled) a list of several of the names of the soldiers. Frank's name was included. He wondered what on earth he had done wrong. To his surprise, he was made the acting sergeant in Basic.

In AIT (Advanced Individual Training), Frank learned to be both a telephone operator and a radio man. Picture an individual sitting in front of a switchboard making connections for incoming and outgoing calls and you have the correct idea of his job.

Frank's first assignment took him to Stuttgart, Germany for one year. He discovered that Bavaria and the Black Forest area were beautiful, and the German people were friendly. During a ten-day leave he traveled to Dachau concentration camp. This was one of the first camps built and was the longest running with over 30,000 documented deaths and many more that were undocumented. Frank said the horror of seeing the cruelty of what humans will do to other humans was almost beyond belief.

The switchboard that Frank used was set up in the back of a deuce and a half truck with a canvas over the top. During the winter, with the north wind howling, it was terribly cold sitting in that truck manning the phone calls. One night a call came in and the voice on the other end said, "You sound very cold." Frank answered that he certainly was. In the morning he discovered that voice belonged to the General, who had kindly arranged for the switchboard to be relocated to a warm place.

As Frank's year was nearing an end, he received his sergeant stripes and his orders for Vietnam on the same day. He flew from Germany to Da Nang, Vietnam. When the plane landed, there was total darkness. Da Nang was under attack. The sound of shelling left no doubt in his mind that he was now in a war zone.

Quang Ny became Frank's new Vietnam assignment. Here he continued as a telephone operator and also as a radio man. Much of the information coming over the phone and radio was classified. Each time Frank received a higher level of security clearance he was given a background check. That meant the FBI went to Carroll, Iowa and contacted the county sheriff, the chief of police, school personnel, his church pastor, and several former employers. The FBI never informed these individuals why they were investigating him. Frank's poor mother was beside herself worrying about what was going on with her son. Until Frank explained to her


the why of the investigation, she didn't have the pleasure of knowing it was all good, not bad.


Frank returned from Vietnam via Seattle. When his plane landed, he was still wearing his dirty Army fatigues and his combat boots. Almost immediately a man approached him yelling, swearing, shaking his fists at him, and getting within an inch or two of his face. Almost before Frank had time to react, another man also stepped forward and pushed the protester out of the way. His comments were entirely different. He said, "I'd like to treat you to a cold beer. Let's go to the bar."

After completion of one year in

Vietnam, Frank still had about a year of service time left. He came back to the States and was stationed at Fort Huachuca in Arizona. Here he was in charge of security for the base. As he became more familiar with the military base, he realized there were many hidden tunnels in the mountains where nuclear activities had taken place.

Now let's go back to that delicious smell. Frank said the food he ate at all the military locations was good, but it doesn't begin to compare with the pies Dianna bakes. If you happen to be at the Iowa State Fair, go find the area where the pies are being judged Sure enough, it is Dianna who is the judge. Ahhh, how lucky for the veteran whose other-half is one of Iowa's great pie bakers!




Don Hummel receives Quilt of Honor


