

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

EXIRA CITY COUNCIL MEETING- WORK SESSION 108 E WASHINGTON ST. – CITY HALL TUESDAY, JUNE 27, 2023

The Exira City Council met for a work session in city hall on Tuesday, June 27, 2023. Present were Mayor Mike Huegerich, City Clerk Meg Andersen, and City Attorney Clint Fichter. Council Members Nathan Wahlert, Doreen Shrader, Clark Borkowski, Mark Paulsen, and Dwight Jessen, as well as public works employee, Mike Lauritsen, were also in attendance. The council reviewed and discussed the following topics and projects:

IDNR required wastewater treatment facility upgrades: The City of Exira will continue to work with JEO Consulting Group. Testing of water samples will begin July 5th when necessary equipment is received. Next meeting with JEO will be held virtually July 13 at 9 AM.

Water: City Clerk and council member Borkowski provided updates from the Regional Water Association board meeting. Regional Water is adding riffles to the Nishnabotna River as a temporary solution, and in the process of connecting to Council Bluffs Waterworks as a permanent water supply solution. It was discussed that it is not feasible to acquire our own water supply and build a new wastewater treatment plant. Council discussed exploring back-up water supply options with the cities of Atlantic, Elk Horn, and Audubon.

Streets, curb and gutter, sidewalks, and trail development: Discussion was had on connecting T-Bone Trail to Exira via Washington St or Legion Park. Street maintenance and upgrades coinciding with curb and gutter replacement were discussed, but need to be fully assessed. City Attorney will set up an assessment, and also present council with a model program for sidewalks at the next work session.


Trees: City Clerk provided updates on tree grants and will begin a tree fundraiser July 1, 2023, to help cover the cash match portion of the Community Forestry Grant. There are at least 7 additional trees that will need to be removed in the city park, as well as others around the city. The IDNR will complete a forestry survey at the end of July and provide a detailed report by Spring 2024 on the condition of all trees on city property. City Attorney will present updated tree ordinance for council review at the regular July council meeting.

Housing: Council discussed need for more housing and programs to assist residents needing home repairs. City Attorney will present on a project to develop city owned E Depot lots at a later meeting.

City Clerk will organize city wide garage sale the first weekend of August in conjunction with Exira Public Library fundraiser.

The work session ended at 6:30 PM.

News From The Mill



GOOD NEWS!

YES, THERE IS GOOD NEWS!

Every once and a while I feel that I should center myself by considering the title of these articles; "Yes there is good news"! It can become a difficult task when (as in our previous article) I take my eyes off the spiritual and onto the physical.

The Apostle Paul gives us an admonition in this regard from his letter to the Colossian church, Col. 3:1-4 "If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life appears, then you also will appear with him in glory."

As is usually the case with Paul, there is a plethora of concepts and knowledge packed into this short 4 scriptural statement. Let's take a look at it and see where it takes us. It should take us to that day in the future when Christ appears and we will, with Him, be glorified.

First off, have you ever reflected on whether or not you have been raised with the Messiah? Now that's a tough one to get your mind around while you are sitting here upon this earth. Most often we think of the time when we are raised with Him as being in the future after we have perished. But in his letter to the Romans Paul tells us that we have already perished if "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?" (Rom. 6:3) So baptism seems to be the key.

Paul continues with this thought in the next verse, "We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life."

You see, baptism is a powerful symbol in regard to our senses. Being submersed in water affects our sense of sight, hearing, touch and if we don't close our mouths we get to taste the water!! Paul continues in verse 5, "For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his."

God's desire for us is to walk in this newness of life with Him. God cannot walk with us while we have the stain of sin upon our hearts.

And so, if we have been raised with Him, we begin to "desire the things that are above." We begin to "Set our minds on things that are above and not on things of the earth". The totality of 'Good News', found in the scriptures begins to affect who we are in relation to the God we serve. Let us then "Walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God." (Col. 1:10) Yes, walk worthy of the Lord; yes, walk in newness of life; yes, walk worthy of your calling; yes, "get up, take your mat and walk"!! (John 5:8)

IT'S ONLY SCIENCE

Last article we discussed some of the factors that determine how successful your community's tourism works. When we say "tourist" we are talking about someone who has traveled more than 50 miles to come to your destination. Those who come a shorter distance than 50 miles are just considered visitors. To be really connected to tourists we must consider how traveling that far will color their experiences in your community.

The tourist has likely already checked out what your community has to offer. They may have an idea of what you offer is of interest to them. But those ideas are not set in stone. If they are greeted with a warm response at their first contact, they are open to your suggestions. That is when you make that all important first impression.

How many of you have actually toured your community's tourism offerings. Have you checked out the local restaurants? What about your local retailers? Can you provide a face-to-face commercial about what they have to offer the visitor? It is one thing when the tourist receives this information from the local welcome center. But it is of a magnitude greater when it comes from a local business. The ultimate advertisement is when it comes from one business about another business.

A community's built environment has much impact on a tourist opinion of your place. Is it obvious that your community is moving forward? Can the tourist see where there has been improvements made to your built environment? Is your business district kept clean and weed free? Do you have buildings that have obviously been well kept and/or restored? And do your residents realize that they are ambassadors for your community. Remember, the shortest distance between people is a smile.

How does the rest of your community look to the tourist? Is it obvious that residents have pride in their properties? Are your park areas well kept? Research has shown that 85% of tourists ask themselves, "would I consider moving here? And it is when the answer to that question is a yes, the odds of those people telling their friends you should check this place out, go way up!

Taking the things mentioned above into consideration, what else can we do to improve the tourist's impression of our community?

It is important that we emphasize that we are an ethnic community. Perhaps not as much as back in 1923 when you knew someone was a visitor by the fact that they spoke English instead of Danish, but ethnicity still provides the tourist draw that others lack. We should capitalize on that with signage, public art, and even some coordinated color palate for our business district.

How many of you readers remember the stress of learning to drive or even worse, the psychological trauma of turning your offspring loose on the highways? I recall one mother of a newly-licensed teenager who phoned all her friends warning them, "Look out world, here he comes."

Back in my day our cars were not equipped with turn signals, automatic shift, power steering, power brakes, power anything. It was quite a caper to get it all together when learning



how to drive. Farm kids probably had an edge on town kids as most had at least a little experience behind the steering wheel of a tractor. Some practiced driving in the oats field after the grain had been bundled and shocked. Sideswiping a shock of oats was no big deal, you just got out of the car, apologized to the scattered bundles and set them up again. With an older brother who was the unpaid but eager farmhand, this young female child got little experience in tractor driving as I grew up. Instead of a steering wheel my hands usually held a dishtowel or a dust-rag. And driver ed classes were unheard of in our 1940s high-school days.

My training (probably illegal) began on our dirt roads when Lyle and I were dating. With the road still a bit sticky from a rain, he decided I should learn the art of driving in mud. There was a pretty good track and all went well until I hit a deep rut, lost control and we got stuck. After a half mile walk to a farm house, the aid of a farmer's son with a tractor and chain, and five bucks less in Lyle's already thin billfold we were on our way again. With his usual good humor, he took it all in stride but my teen-age lessons on driving on muddy roads came to an abrupt halt.

Several years later, now married with a couple of kids, it was apparent that we needed two drivers in our home. With a few sketchy lessons, mostly on country roads, I found myself at the courthouse in Harlan breezing through the written test, passing with flying colors. Then came the driving test. That's when things started to turn ugly. As we drove aimlessly over the streets of Harlan the officer kept telling me, "Keep to the right...keep to the right." Eventually he asked if most of my practice driving had been on country roads. This hick from the sticks squeaked out a "Yes" and drove on. I really thought I was doing pretty well until he commented, "I can't pass you if you keep wandering all over the road." Fortunately, he didn't ask me to parallel park and, wonder of wonders, he did pass me. We parted company and that was the last I ever saw of him. He most likely went home, took a couple of aspirin and spent the afternoon trembling on the couch. I'm pretty sure that is what I did.

The years passed quickly and ready or not we were faced with the fact that we had two teen-aged girls champing at the bit to get behind the wheel. They both had some tractor driving experience and the benefit of a driver education program in high school but we still didn't have a car with the amenities that make driving easy. It did, however, have turn signals although it was not equipped with anything automatic. The girls, too, had to learn the art of shifting using the clutch and gear-shift lever. That took a little practice. I well remember our first family outing with Daughter Number Two in the driver's seat. Her dad was the co-pilot and her mother and Daughter Number One sat quivering in the back seat. I wrote a little poem in honor of the occasion:

Gears grind in and the car reverses; Father in front seat scowls and curses.

After numerous engine kills the car hops rabbit-like over the hills.

Mom wrings her hands and finds her feet braking against the back of the seat.

Stops are short, starts are jerky. Father's face looks rather murky.

Mother glances at 'Seventeen' who utters a groan and turns pea-green.

Pale and shaken we finally arrive....."Sweet Sixteen" is learning to drive!

By the way, both girls and their mother turned out to be quite competent drivers. Practice doesn't necessarily make perfect but it certainly does help a lot.

The City Council of Elk Horn met in regular session Wednesday July 5th, 2023, at 6:00 PM with the following members present: Mayor Hansen, Councilmen: Teegerstrom, Fredericksen and Hogberg. Absent: D. Petersen and K. Petersen

Guests in attendance were Austin Sondag, and Eric Jorgensen from Snyder & Associates, Tim Plumb, Karen Schleuter, Alex Londo with Shelby County EMA, Lori Hoflen, Annette Madsen, and Chad Juelsgaard.

Mayor Hansen called the meeting to order at 6:00PM

Fredericksen moved, seconded by Hogberg to approve the agenda as presented. Ayes 3, motion carried.

Hogberg moved, seconded by Teegerstrom to approve the June 5th, 2023, meeting minutes. Ayes 3, motion carried.

Shelby County EMS provided an update to become an Essential Service. EMS plans to have Town Hall meetings throughout the county to further discuss with taxpayers. It will be on the ballot for November's election. This needs to be passed for the county to continue to have 24-7 ALS capabilities available after Medivac completes their contract.

Snyder & Associates presented the final plans and specifications for the Pool house project. Teegerstrom moved, seconded by Fredericksen to approve resolution 2023-7.1 – Authorizing Bid letting & setting public hearing. Bid letting submissions must be turned into City Hall by Thursday August 3rd at 2PM. Ayes 3. Motion carried.

Snyder & Associates presented the Wastewater preliminary engineering permit. Fredericksen moved, seconded by Hogberg, to approve the Wastewater permit for submittal. Ayes 3, motion carried.

Fence Ordinance Changes tabled till August 7th meeting.

Josh Nelson was approved by the Water in Progress internship program. This program allows Josh to work directly under the Public Works director while learning the roles of Water and wastewater operations. This program provides \$5,000.00 in wages to help support future operators. Josh's wages will be reimbursed to the city in full though the Water in Progress Internship. Hogberg moved, seconded by Fredericksen to approve \$11.50 an hour for Josh's internship wage. Ayes 3, Motion carried.

The Iowa DOT stated the tree at Washington & Main needs to be removed due to being in the ROW. The city will receive 2 bids for taking down the tree on Main Street and the remaining 9 trees in the park that are dead.

The hotel court hearing has been scheduled for August 24th, 2023.

Well-Child Visits Take Place of Athletic Physicals

Now is the time to get your regular check-up for a child under the age of 18.

The regular check-up is often referred to as a "well-child visit." These visits help ensure that infants, children and teens are getting the proper care they need to stay healthy. They give the doctor, parents and child an opportunity to talk about nutrition, safety, immunizations and many important age-appropriate topics.

A well-child exam also fulfills the requirements of an athletic physical, also referred as a "back to school exam". This year, Myrtue will not schedule a block of visits specifically for athletic physicals. Instead, parents should call to schedule a well-child visit for their adolescent or teen at a time that works with their schedule. This will meet the athletic physical requirements for participation in 7-12 grade school activities.

Well-child exams will be filed with insurance and you can have one wellness check per year. Many plans pay 100% for a wellness exam. Check with your insurance company, if you have any questions.

"Many parents don't know that a well-child exam will qualify as an athletic physical," said Dr. Sarah Devine, pediatrician at Myrtue Medical Center. "Just bring the required athletic physical paperwork, and we will complete the form for you. The athletic physical lasts for 13 months."

Does a well-child visit count as an athletic physical?

Yes, an athletic physical exam is part of the well-child visit and is known as a pre-participation physical examination. The exam helps determine whether it is safe for a child to participate in a particular sport. The sports physical focuses on your well-being as it relates to playing a sport. A well-child exam is much more comprehensive and includes reviewing immunization records, discussions about behaviors, school issues and proper nutrition with the child.

How does a well-child check benefit my school-age child?

As your child grows, his or her body is going through a lot. It is important to monitor these changes closely to know if the development is happening at a normal rate. Growth patterns tend to change as children enter the pre-pubescent/adolescent stage of life. The wellness exam gives the practitioner a chance to provide the child with a thorough physical exam that also addresses any emotional, developmental, or social concerns. Well-child checks continue to be beneficial in providing education to middle schoolers and high schoolers, and their parents, on these changes and any challenges that may be present.

This annual visit provides an opportunity to discuss diet, exercise options, provide vision screenings, and additional testing. It is also a good chance to address important questions or concerns you have as a parent, especially with teenagers, including adolescent issues of substance use such as drinking, smoking and depression.

Routine Immunization

"Certain diseases have become so rare because of immunizations that many parents question whether their children need them," said Dr. Devine. "Immunizations are one of the best ways to end the potentially serious effects of many diseases. Vaccines save lives. They are an important part of keeping your child healthy."

Myrtue Medical Center will Open a Temporary ER Entrance During Renovation and Expansion


Starting on July 6, 2023, the Hospital's Emergency Department (ED) entrance along Garfield Ave will close to allow for an estimated 13-month expansion and renovation of the current emergency room. A temporary emergency entrance will be located just to the west of the existing ER, still on Garfield Ave in the current inpatient visitor entrance. Exterior signage will direct patients to the new temporary ER entrance on Garfield Ave.

Patients seeking emergent care will enter on Garfield Avenue. They will check in at a temporary lobby and waiting area. Myrtue will keep this entrance open for the Emergency Department and inpatient visitors of the hospital.

With this renovation and expansion, the temporary helipad will be located in the northeast section of the employee parking lot. The hospital's Chatburn Avenue main entrance will remain open for non-emergent patient appointments at the Harlan Clinic.

When complete, the Emergency Department expansion will increase space and improve workflow in the ER. The renovation will provide approximately 8,700 square feet of space, an expansion of about 3,400 square feet from the ER's current footprint.

Murray Company, the construction company overseeing the project, will use the area to the east of the Hospital campus, along 12th Street, to stage materials, equipment and construction office trailers during construction.

Outlook Study Club is a local woman's club with about 25 members. It has been in the community since the 1940's and helped establish and supports the Elk Horn Library.




