

Mortensen receives Community Leader Award from Missouri River Energy Services

SIOUX FALLS, SOUTH DAKOTA — **Peggy Mortensen, of Kimballton, Iowa**, was honored with the Community Leader Award during the 59th Annual Meeting of Missouri River Energy Services (MRES).

The awards presentation was held May 8 as part of the Annual Meeting's program at the Sioux Falls Convention Center in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. The Community Leader Award was established in 2003 to honor local officials from MRES member communities who have provided many years of service to their communities and public power systems.

Since 1999, Mortensen has served on Kimballton's City Council in various roles, including as mayor pro tem and as mayor. She was nominated by Carol Hartvigsen, who is also a former mayor of Kimballton.

During the awards presentation, MRES Board Chair Vernell Roberts said Mortensen has been a driving force in advancing Kimballton's electrical system to modern standards. "She's also written articles for the local paper about the past, present and future of the Kimballton electric system and has attended multiple MRES events, including the Municipal Power Leadership Academy, annual meetings, area meetings and policymaker dinners," Roberts continued. "It's very important to recognize that many people like Peggy serve in community leadership positions throughout the MRES membership. They each do it for the benefit of the communities in which they live, and their selfless contributions are very deserving of this award."

MRES is an organization of 61 member municipalities in Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota. Each member owns and operates a municipal electric utility. MRES provides its members with wholesale electricity and a wide range of energy-related services.

And they can just keep waiting because I for one am not ready to throw in the towel yet!

We may have gained a lot of book-learning during our early years of education, but I think most of us would agree that the greatest lessons of life came from living it. One lesson I gradually came to understand is that life is a great equalizer. And no matter how exciting or fulfilling classmates' lives appeared, we all had our share of mountain tops and deep valleys, our disappointments, and our victories. In other words, life teaches some great lessons.

As all school secretaries are well aware, the last couple weeks of the school year rank right up near the top as the busiest. That evening when Julie and her current boyfriend arrived home from a date, they decided to sit for a while in the glider. All was well until he got up to escort Julie to the door. The stark, black paint was not quite dry and the open-work grid design on the swing was boldly imprinted in black on the seat of his brandnew white denim jeans.

But we got them in and the milking done, cleaned ourselves up and were ready to go. With a quick final inspection of the



house and yard I discovered to my disgust that one wayward cow had left her little round calling card right in front of that half-circle of lawn chairs. In one mighty, desperate swing, I hoisted that heavy sandfilled bird-bath and plopped it down over that soupy cow pie. And we made it to the graduation ceremony with a few minutes to spare.







AN EXTRAORDINARY NURSE IS **RECOGNIZED AT Myrtue Medical Center**

MAY 8, 2024 (HARLAN, IA) - Nurses at Myrtue Medical Center are being honored with The DAISY Award® For Extraordinary Nurses. The award is part of the DAISY Foundation's programs to recognize the super-human efforts nurses perform every day.

The not-for-profit DAISY Foundation was established by family members in memory of J. Patrick Barnes. Barnes died at the age of 33, in late 1999, from complications of Idiopathic Thrombocytopenic Purpura (ITP), a little-known autoimmune disease. The care he and his family received from nurses while he was ill inspired this unique means of thanking nurses for making a profound difference in the lives of their patients and patient families. Shortly after Patrick's death, the nonprofit DAISY Foundation was formed with DAISY standing for Diseases Attacking the Immune SYstem.

Myrtue Medical Center implemented The DAISY Award nomination in 2019 and an honoree is recognized twice per year in a special ceremony. In May 2024, during National Nurses Week, the DAISY award recipient at Myrtue Medical Center was Michelle Wageman, RN, BSN, who is a nurse in Myrtue's Inpatient Department. Michelle's winning nomination expressed the exceptional care she provided to the writer's elderly mother, while also addressing all health issues efficiently and with kindness. The writer also wrote how Michelle's care was instrumental in the mother's recovery and return



Elk Horn is a city in Shelby County, Iowa, United States. The population was 601 at the time of the 2020 census. Elk Horn is known as an enclave of Danish ethnicity and is home to the Museum of Danish America.

Elk Horn was platted in 1901, and incorporated as a town in 1910. The city took its name from Elk Horn Creek. Newspaper articles from the Atlantic, Iowa newspaper published in 1919 on the death of Mrs. Winters and 1939 on the history of Clay Township In 1864 a colony of Wisconsin people with 3 or 4 covered wagons came to Iowa to establish a town and settled on a knoll two miles southwest of what is now Elk Horn. With the establishment of the post office, Mrs. Caroline Whitney Winters, wife of Theron W. Winters suggested the name of Elk Horn as so many elk shed their horns in the timber there. Mrs. Winters was the first post mistress as the post office was kept in the Winters cabin for a number of years. Her husband traversed the stage route along the ridge country between Grove City and Harlan, carrying the mail prior to the advent of the railroad. The site of the cabin was later occupied by Chris and Stena Jensen, and the Lawrence Nelson and Mrs. Peter M Petersen farms.

Thoughts to Ponder. How Green is Green Energy?

Coyote Willow Wind is proposing a project of 66-100 wind turbines in the southwest corner of Audubon County. The area consists of land west of Hwy 71 to the Shelby County line and from Hwy 44 south to the Cass County line.


Are you curious as to what it takes to construct a single wind turbine? According to the American Wind Energy Association, "it takes somewhere in the range of 200-230 tons of steel to make a single wind turbine" requiring 170 tons of coking coal and 300 tons of iron, all mined, transported and produced by hydrocarbons. Also used in the construction of wind generators are fiberglass, resin or plastic, copper and rare earth minerals, the last of which is primarily sourced in China. Each wind turbine requires 850-900 yards of concrete and a service road. A five megawatt turbine can require 700 gallons of lubricant and costly synthetic fuels. Oil change intervals are scheduled for from 9-16 months. Presently, wind farm operators "repower" the turbines about once a decade. New blades, for example.

Normally, a wind turbine lasts for 20-30 years, according ,to information on Coyote Willow Winds website. When no longer in use they eventually will be taken down.

So, what happens to the old blades, concrete foundations, service roads, and underground cables that are below four feet? In the building of wind generators, could this ever be accomplished without using hydrocarbons to mine, transports, produce and lubricate them?







As these words are being written, the forecast for this coming

weekend is not too promising. The whole week shows scattered chances of storms and Friday and Saturday are not projected to have a lot of wind. We hope to see the skies clear, and that the wind may pick up so we can drive our millstones. We intend to hold grinding demonstrations throughout Friday and Saturday in the wind is there. Optimal wind speeds for grinding start at about 18 - 20 mph. We can grind with less for show, but it's not the same. In the mean time we're hoping for the best and either way, people will get to see the sails turn all weekend. It's free admission all weekend, and the mill will be open to walk through. Our tour video will be playing every 15 minutes on the hour for those looking to get the full experience with a guided tour.

The rest of the mill's regular programming will go on. We'll have our local Danish dancers and the Omaha Scandinavian folk dancers on the stage Saturday afternoon. The Vikings will be around Friday and Saturday with demonstrations and tours, plus live battles next to the former hotel at 1:30 and 4:00 on Saturday. We've stocked up on Viking gear, so don't miss the opportunity to get your own swords, helmets, and shields in the gift shop. Tivoli t-shirts will be sold at the windmill with the exception of Friday evening. They're available now, and we encourage people to get them early to guarantee size selection. They will be sold at the fire station Friday night. On Saturday, we will have a booth setup outside selling t-shirts and soft drinks to help keep the lines shorter inside the gift shop.

We're also ready to announce that the mill's boneyard has finally been cleared. We would like to thank Andy Anderson, Chris Fredericksen, and Kodie Haas for their help in clearing the old timbers. A few good pieces have been salvaged for various projects, but the rotten wings and cap frame are finally gone. We will begin working on the construction of our new entertainment building once Tivoli has passed, and we hope to hold some special events this Summer on our grounds to inaugurate it.

Longtime Iowa women's basketball coach Lisa Bluder announced her retirement Monday, May 13. Taking over to lead the Hawkeyes will be her longtime assistant coach, Kimballton native Jan Jensen. Both have been instrumental in the Hawkeyes' rise to one of the nation's most successful programs.



IOWA CITY – With the retirement Monday of Iowa women's basketball coach Lisa Bluder, the Hawkeye athletic department didn't have to look too far to find her successor.

She is from southwest Iowa, and her name is Jan Jensen, the Kimballton native who led the team to multiple state tournaments in six-on-six basketball, and led the country with 66 ppg during her senior year in 1987.

The past 24 years have seen Jensen serve as an assistant coach at lowa under Bluder, and eight before that at Drake University. Jensen has been associate head coach for 20 years, and with Bluder's retirement announcement Monday was promoted to become the sixth head coach in program history.

In a statement issued on <u>hawkeyesports.com</u>, Jensen said she was blessed to be part of Bluder's program, both as a player and then as an assistant coach. She is now looking forward to her new role in continuing the success of one of college women's basketball's most successful programs the past several years.

"I can't thank Lisa enough for her mentorship, leadership, and most of all her friendship," Jensen said. "I am so proud of all we accomplished and grateful for all the memories we created. I am now beyond elated to begin my new role and want to thank (University of Iowa President Barbara J.) Wilson and Beth for the opportunity to lead this program.

"I truly love The University of Iowa and I am profoundly honored and excited to continue building on our success. The support we have in every realm from our administration, donors, alumni and fans is unmatched and I am so proud to be a part of this special university," she continued. lowa athletics director Beth Goetz, in announcing Jensen's hire, said the program has "always been about family," and she has made many positive contributions to its incredible culture that are shared by many.

"(Jensen is) one of those contributors has been in the team circle for 24 years as a tireless recruiter, skilled teacher of the game, and charismatic personality that has endeared her to the Hawkeye community," said Goetz. "Coach Jensen has been an instrumental part of our success, assisting in all aspects of the program. After several conversations with Coach Bluder and president Wilson over the last few days, it is clear that everything that we are seeking in a head coach, we have found right here."

On Bluder's retirement, Goetz said, "It is bittersweet news for all of us who love the University of Iowa and who have incredible admiration and respect for what Coach Bluder has accomplished and for how she did it. Lisa has left an indelible mark on this program, touched countless lives, and brought joy to all who know and love the Hawkeyes. Words can't appropriately express the gratitude I share with so many for the impact she has made on the game of women's basketball and the University of Iowa.

"While we are saddened that she will no longer lead our young women on the court, we are thankful for what she has given to all of us and are comforted knowing she will continue to be our biggest champion and fan," she continued.

Jensen, who helped guide lowa to 22 postseason appearances, including 18 NCAA Tournaments, will enter her 25th year as a Hawkeye coach in 2024-25. Jensen was instrumental in mentoring the Hawkeyes to five Big Ten Tournament titles, including three straight, and sharing two regular season conference championships. Jensen and the Hawkeyes advanced to back-to-back national championships games this past spring and in 2023, and also reached the Elite Eight in 2019, and Sweet 16 in 2015.

Jensen began her coaching career at her alma mater, Drake University, in 1993 as an assistant to Coach Bluder, winning four Missouri Valley Conference tournaments and three regular season championships (1997, 1998, 2000) on the Drake coaching staff.

Jensen quickly gained attention for her recruiting prowess and development of post players. Jensen and the Hawkeye recruiting classes consistently rank among the nation's elite. Since arriving in Iowa City, she has been integral in attracting top recruits to the University of Iowa, including McDonald's All-Americans Samantha Logic, Lindsay Richards, Johanna Solverson and Caitlin Clark, and concensus all-Americans Clark, Logic, Kathleen Doyle and Megan Gustafson. Gustafson and Clark were each named the Naismith Player Of the Year.

Jensen was named first-team all-state her senior year of high school by botht he Iowa Newspaper Association and the Des Moines Register. Elk Horn-Kimballton reached the quarterfinals of the state six-on-six tournament her senior year.

Jensen's grandmother, Dorcas Randolph, was part of the Audubon girls' basketball teams that reached the state tournaments in 1920 and 1921.

Bluder was named head coach at the University of Iowa in 2000 and retires as the all-time winningest coach in Big Ten history with an overall record of 528-254 and a Big Ten record of 262-145. Under her leadership, the Hawkeyes advanced to 22 post-season appearances including 14 of the last 16 NCAA tournaments and four Women's National Invitational Tournaments. The Hawkeyes won five Big Ten Tournament championships and shared two Big Ten regular-season titles.

Veteran of the Month May 23, 2024



LARRY WHEELER MEMORIES SHARED BY WIDOW SANDY WHEELER

A common expression that is often heard is "military family." A person probably envisions a family where one of the spouses is currently serving in the military and the family may be moving from place to place, depending on where deployments took them. Maybe there can be a broader definition of military family. That broader definition would include the mothers, fathers, spouses, siblings, and grandparents who eagerly watch, worry, and wait for information concerning their loved one. Larry's family had a "double dose"

when the two older boys joined military service at the same time. Both Larry and his brother, Charlie, knew the draft was hot on their trail. The year was 1966, Larry was 21 years old, and many young men were heading to Vietnam. The Wheeler brothers preferred the Marines to the Army. Together they said goodbye and headed to Camp Pendleton in California. The Marines were more than happy for recruits; however, they had concern with two brothers entering into basic training at the same time. The military remembered the Sullivan family, also from Iowa, who lost five sons when the Navy ship they were all assigned on was torpedoed and sank.

During training Larry's instructors noticed that he held his gun in a position that was not in compliance with his USMC range training. Larry shot left-eyed. The trainers would not allow him to shoot that way. They kept making him change to a right-eyed shooting position, which he found to be unnatural and uncomfortable. He had grown up on a farm and loved to hunt, trap, and fish at a very young age. He knew his way around a rifle. The instructors said the empty bullet cartridge would come back and hit him in the face. He finally convinced one of his instructors to let him shoot left-eyed—the way he had shoot all his life. Not only did it work well, but he also turned out to be an excellent left-eyed shooter. They told him they were putting together a sniper school and wondered if he would be interested in sniper training. He jumped at the chance. He turned out to be one of their best shooters.

At the completion of training, Larry headed to Vietnam. He was stationed for his entire year's assignment near the demilitarized zone. In Vietnam, snipers always worked in twos. Larry's partner was an Aleut Indian from Alaska. The two developed a very trusting relationship. It was a life and death matter, and they always had each other's back. They both realized a sniper could never let emotion rule.

When Larry returned from the service, he didn't talk much about Vietnam. One thing that soon became apparent was the increased respect

he had for his father. Both men shared the experience of serving in a war. Although service in WW2 and Vietnam were very different in many respects, they also shared many things in common.

Now a veteran, Larry began working in Des Moines for several local companies while he attended Drake University. At this point, Sandy came into his life. She lived in the same apartment complex and worked for Blue Cross/Blue Shield. They were friends for two and a half years before they began to date. When they initially met, she did not know he was a Vietnam veteran, but as their friendship developed, she learned that he was a Vietnam veteran. She always called him John. He was a big man and she said "you're a one-syllable name." From the early 70s on, he was always John to her.



Sandy had grown up in Kentucky Virginia with a very proper southern mother who expected her daughter to marry a man with money. When Sandy announced that she was planning to marry an lowa farmer, her mother just about came unglued. If she was going to marry a farmer, it should at least be one who raised thoroughbred horses! After marriage when Sandy was back on the farm, she realized how extra special her lowa farm boy was. Over the years as they drove back and forth to work in Des Moines (and at many other times), Sandy made it a high priority to ask questions about his war experiences. She wanted him to feel that she was a safe space for him to share thoughts, even painful and ugly ones. After all, they had shared all their secrets before and he was very comfortable talking to her about his experiences in Vietnam. She never judged him.

In 2017 Sandy began to notice changes in Larry's health and behavior that she knew must surely be related to his Vietnam experiences. He did not have outward visible wounds, his scars were hidden, but very real. As he aged, he talked about how much it bothered him that he had been responsible for taking life. He developed many of the physical conditions that are associated with Agent Orange exposure. Sandy worked tirelessly to get medical attention through specialists and disability assistance from the VA. It was after his death that she received a letter from the VA that his death was declared 100 percent military related. As she stands at his grave in the Exira Cemetery, with tears streaming down her face, she whispers, "John, you were the perfect partner, and I will always love and miss you."

Sandy would like to leave us with this message: "always honor our veterans and remember, just because the veteran does not display physical wounds, I can assure you, the wounds are there. Our veterans deserve our honor, respect, and love."

Exira-EHK may well have its first top-three state track medalist ever in school history since the former Exira and Elk Horn-Kimballton schools came together in 2010.

"I don't think anyone's ever gotten to the podium until this year, so that was a big goal of mine," said Cash Emgarten, who may well have made school history with his third-place finish in the finals of Iowa Class 1A 100-meter dash Saturday, May 18 at Drake Stadium, Des Moines. "It feels great to be the first one to do it."

He finished in 11.19, and the bronze was his best finish of the two sprint finals he was in. Later Saturday, he came in fourth in the 200-meter dash, in 22.49, one place better than a year ago in the same event.

He qualified for the finals in both events earlier in the week, finishing fourth in the 100-meter preliminaries with a time of 10.89, and fourth in the 200 at 22.49. The top eight times out of 24 in the preliminary heat advance to the finals.

On Friday, May 17, Emgarten – a four-event qualifier for the Spartans – finished ninth in the high jump with a best jump of 6'1". Later in the day, he joined Exira-EHK to run a time of 1:34.47 for 21st place; with him were Alex Hansen, Bryce Brabham and Jonas LaCanne.

LaCanne, another senior for the Spartans, also competed at state for the Spartans, finishing 23rd in the boys' 400-meter hurdles in 58.55 on Friday afternoon.

Emgarten is now done with his high school athletic career, off to play football at Midland University in Fremont, Neb.

For now, it's reflecting on his performances.

"I felt I got out of the blocks real well," he said. "I was even with the first two guys but they (the Lisbon duo of Baylor Speidel and Tiernan Boots) were really fast."

Progression was really good for Emgarten. The beginning he wasn't where he wanted to be, but slowly he got up to where he wanted to be.

"It's the quickest race. Less work," he said. "This year is really special, all my classes and all my classmates I got to run with. I think the future (of Exira-EHK track) is bright. We've got great coaches and we have kids that want to put int the work and succeed."



Exira-EHK saw its season come to an end earlier this month after finishing seventh at an Iowa Class 1A sectional meet Wednesday at Lakeside Golf Course.

Jameson Kilworth led the Spartans with a 98, while Josh Nelson (99), Alex Hansen (103) and Jackson Radcliff (104) rounded out the scorecard. Cole Brabham and Chase Schwab each fired a 105. West Fork of Sheffield and Coon Rapids-Bayard advanced as teams to the CAM-hosted district at Crestwood Hills Golf Course in Anita. At the Rolling Valley Conference meet, the Spartans finished fifth of six teams at the meet, conducted at Carroll Country Club. Alex Hansey had the best round with a 97, while Josh Nelson fired a 98, Jameson Kilworth a 99 and Cole Brabham a 107. Also competing were Jackson Radcliff at 108 and Quintinn White a 149. For the season, Nelson had the best course-adjusted average – the factor used in golf handicaps for nine holes of play – of 52.2, while Brabham had a 55.2, Radcliff at 56.1 and Schwab at 56.2.
